• Arthur Cohen's 1995 proposal on the g lesion reflects our respect for debate and idea evaluation.

Rigorous Evaluation Process

 Adoption of the ptc lesion after thorough research validation shows our effective, evidence-based evaluation method.

Dual System for Change Tracking

 The dual system combines rapid electronic communications with traditional mentorship for decisionmaking.

Inclusivity Efforts

- Efforts to include diverse voices are highlighted by contributions from Dele Adeyi, a Nigerian transplant pathologist at the University of Minnesota, and Mohamed El Hag, a Sudanese member of the liver group and session chair in Paris, promoting equity and diversity in our conferences.
