Women owned and led businesses in New Zealand




Figure 1. Share of New Zealand firms by number of employees





Potential challenges faced by women traders

- In New Zealand the **distance to markets** are a major challenge for our businesses.
- In New Zealand women owned and led businesses tend to be SMEs.
- Women led businesses can face a number of additional challenges in international trade.
 - Shallower networks making it harder to access connections and learn from other's experiences;
 - Balancing responsibilities/being time poor.



Outreach to Māori role

- This role was created to provide advice and to develop and maintain strong and trusting relationships with small – medium Māori exporters.
- Engaging helps ensure that Māori businesses understand the benefits of the being an SES partner and are supported to sign up.
- This role enhances our relationship with Māori exporters, grows our own awareness of the difficulties they face and support the Crowns objective of working closely with Māori.






Considerations going forward
