He informed that the AGM report has been uploaded on ENSEARCH website for members' reference and to refer to his opening address on Page 3.

2.0 CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES OF THE 32ndANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON 19th MAY 2016.

- 2.1 The meeting was called to order at 4.30pm and quorum for the AGM to proceed was established.
- 2.2 The Hon General Secretary tabled the 32ndAGM Minutes of Meeting from Pages 6 to 12.
- 2.9 Dr Loo Koi Sang proposed to adopt the Minutes of the 32ndAnnual General Meeting. The motion was seconded by Mr Mohamed Siraj Abdul Razack and Dato' Ir Othman Abdul Rahim.

4.0 Tabling of the 33rdAnnual Report 2016/2017

- 4.1 The Hon. General Secretary thanked all Council members present for their continuous support.
- 4.2 The Hon. General Secretary presented the Annual Report for 2016.
- 4.3 The Hon. General Secretary presented the reports from the ENSEARCH Standing Committees (Pages 13 to 31 of the Annual Report) as follows:-

 - Cyber Plant Conservation Network (CPCN)
 - Education and Training
 - Publication and Website
 - Membership
 - Events and Activities

 - Centre for Environmental Technologies (CETEC)
 - Malaysian Environmental NGOs (MENGO)
 - ENSEARCH Air Quality Technical Interest Group
 - PRIME MINISTER'S HIBISCUS AWARD (PMHA)

- 4.4 Hon. General Secretary announced Dr Mohd Amri Bin Lajis has volunteered to become ENSEARCH's Council member and will be considered for co-option into the Council.
- 4.5 The Hon. General Secretary informed that Petronas soon will nominate new Council member as their representative.
- 4.6 Hon. General Secretary informed that Mr Khoo Boon Keat was unable to attend all the Council meetings; however he is fulfilling his portfolio as Website and Publication Standing Committee by overseeing work over the week. Hon. General Secretary also announced that ENSEARCH Website has been fully revamped and is very much improved.
- 4.7 Membership Committee is now very actively chaired by Mr Mohamed Siraj Abdul Razack and is overseen by Vice President Dr Foo Say Moo to improve membership intake.
- 4.8 Hon. General Secretary announced that the KKEF Board chaired by Dr Foo Say Moo has successfully conducted the KKEF Memorial Public Lecture 2016 and the Internship Award Winner Ms Chia Wern Shin has participated in the internship program with E5 Campus, Hong Kong. Ms Chia Wern Shin will present her Internship Report on the next KKEF Public Lecture.
- 4.9 The President and Hon. General Secretary announced to members that Mr Akashah Hj Majizat, Dr Paul Quek and Mr Peter Ho are continuing to work on CPCN project. CPCN is gearing up to make data collecting process related to trees, lakes, wetlands and other ecosystem to be more interesting to members.
- 4.10 Hon. General Secretary updated few training held successfully in year 2016. ENSEARCH conducted two (2) trainings in up to April 2017. The "Train the Trainer" was successfully conducted in March 2017. She informed that the trainer is very keen to have "Train the Trainer" training exclusively for ENSEARCH members again. ENSEARCH will conduct the training again if we have enough participants with a minimum of 20pax.
- 4.11 Hon. General Secretary updated that the Training Room of ENSEARCH is now available for rental. ENSEARCH will also working actively to conduct more in-house Trainings as we have more HRDF-Certified Trainers. All the latest information will be uploaded on ENSEARCH website.
- 4.12 The Hon. General Secretary informed that ENSEACH Sabah Branch will have their Annual General Meeting soon and will come out with new plans to enhance their revenue.
- 4.13 The Hon. General Secretary updated that CENTRE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL TECHNOLOGIES (CETEC) has been officially wound up.

- 4.14 The Hon. General Secretary announced that ENSEARCH is actively represented in the 3 PMHA Committees Organizing Committee, Steering Committee & Technical Committee
- 4.15 Hon. General Secretary apologized to members for not including reports on EQC. She updated some info on EQC; Chair of EQC, Prof Dato Dr Mazlin announced that amendments to the Environment Quality Act are now being done by Jabatan Alam Sekitar which is now proposing the Environment Protection Act. The spirit of this new act is to look towards the aspiration of the country in 2050. EQC wants all its members to look into the current Act 1974 which was amended in 2012, and comments on items to be enhanced.
- 4.16 Mr Gopi from Fanli Marine & Consultancy Sdn Bhd suggested formation as a Subcommittee to look into marine pollution matter. Hon. General Secretary informed that ENSEARCH will work to establish a Committee soon. Updates will be given to all ENSEARCH members.
- 4.17 The President announced that ENSEARCH is one of the NGO among only 2 NGOs' in EQC. Consultants and Corporate Members are encouraged to take it as a good opportunity to participate in deliberations under the EQC.
- 4.18 Hon General Secretary informed that a separate report on EQC will be uploaded on ENSERACH website soon.

5.0 FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDING 31st DECEMBER 2016

- 5.1 The Hon. Treasurer went through the Audited Financial Statement for the year ended 31st December 2016. She updated that Standard Chartered Accounts has been closed and the entire funds have been moved to Maybank Berhad.
- 5.2 The Hon. Treasurer explained that ENSEARCH income has increased compared to year 2015 however the expenditures had also increased as there are more activities.
- 5.3 The Hon. Treasurer updated that ENSEARCH is still maintaining KKEF & CPCN funds. Meanwhile ENSEARCH had also earned some Rental income from Red Auto Studio Tenant of ground floor.
- 5.4 She also requested Members support on ENSEARCH revenue via membership and trainings activities.
- 5.5 The President added that ENSEARCH's main major program 13th APRSCP which will be held in October 2017 is expected to increase revenue for ENSEARCH.

- 5.6 Hon. General Secretary added on that ENSEARCH has undertaken cost cutting measures to cut down such as Oracle Management the external accounts provider is now no longer serving ENSEARCH. ENSEARCH accounts will be fully handled internally by Ms Vishal, the Executive Secretary.
- 5.7 She also thanked Yokomax (M) Sdn Bhd for their sponsorship of RM24,000.00 for one year with the amount of RM 2,000.00 per month.
- 5.7 There were no objections and questions from members on Audited report presented. Dato' Ir Othman Abdul Rahim proposed the adoption of the annual report, financial report and balance sheet. The motion was seconded by Mr Ng Tiong Sheng.

- 6.3 Hon Sec. General informed that Dr Mohd Amri Bin Lajis has volunteered himself to serve ENSEARCH as co-opted council member.

- 7.1 The President opened to the floor the election for the position of Hon. Internal Auditors.

- 7.2 Hon. General Secretary informed that ENSEARCH want to change Auditor as the fees keep on increasing every year. On the change of External Auditors, the President requested for Members present to allow the Council to decide. All members agreed.

8.0 OTHER MATTERS

- 8.1 Dr Foo Say Moo as a Chairperson of KKEF Board, announced and welcomed Members to publicize the internship program which is on-going. The closing date will be on 15th July 2017. Members aged below 35 years old are welcome to participate.
- 8.2 The President updated on the 13th APRSCP. ENSEARCH is putting more efforts on organizing 13th APRSCP. ENSEARCH has a strong Working Group which is led by The President, Mr Gobinathan Kumaran Nair, Hon. General Secretary Ms Geetha P Kumaran, Hon Treasurer Ms Jenny Tan, Dato' Halimah, Dato' Ir Othman Abdul Rahim and Dr Hari.
- 8.3 The President informed ENSEARCH secured 3 Sponsors for 13thAPRSCP; however we are still looking for more Sponsors. Besides, Chief Minister of Melaka State has agreed to sponsor one cocktail dinner for the 13th APRSCP.
- 8.4 The budget for 13th APRSCP is RM700,000.00, hence ENSEARCH is encouraging Corporate Members to support.
- 8.5 Dato' Ir Othman Abdul Rahim, proposed ENSEARCH to conduct more Trainings for JKR staff. As Dato Dr Roslan is ENSEARCH's long standing member, ENSEARCH should contact him on this matter.
- 8.6 The Hon. General Secretary accepted the suggestion and informed that ENSEARCH will contact Dato' Dr Roslan on this matter as soon as possible.
- 8.7 The President and Hon. General Secretary thanked the Members who attended the Annual General Meeting and since there were no further discussion and objection, the 33rd Annual General Meeting has been successfully concluded.



3.1.1 The KKEF Memorial Public Lecture 2017

The KKEF Memorial Public Lecture and Young Environmentalist Award was held on 12th December 2017 at Dewan Presiden, Kelab Golf Negara Subang, Kelana Jaya. KTA Tenaga Sdn Bhd, of which Ir. Kumarasivam was a founding partner, supported by providing a sum of RM2000.00 towards the event.

The Speaker for the Public Lecture was Emeritus Professor Dr Muhamad bin Awang. He was the Vice Chancellor of SEGI University. He was also a Professor in the Department of Environmental Science, Universiti Putra Malaysia. His lecture titled, 'Aligning Environmental Education and Training Goals in meeting Industry Needs' attracted both members of ENSEARCH and the public who were from diverse professions. He is also kindly contributed back his token of RM1000.00 to the KKEF Fund and was willing to share his PowerPoint Slides which is available on the ENSEARCH website.

3.1.2 The KKEF Young Environmentalist Internship Award 2017

The 13th recipient of KKEF Young Environmentalist Award is Mr Sathis Venkitasamy. His winning Essay spoke about waste water management. The judges agreed that the topic was relevant, and the intern demonstrated his passion by joining Global Environment Centre (GEC) which he entrusted with river management, water management, solid waste management and environmental education programs. Until today, he had undertaken various projects covering important environmental aspects. He successfully carried out Water Conservation Programme for Schools in Malaysia which he developed water auditing calculator for Malaysian schools. Being a firm believer in practical environmentalism, Mr. Sathis actively gives talks on environmental education and awareness during training, seminar, Astro interview and so on. He is also appointed panel judge since 2016 for 'Selangor Beach and River Adoption Competition' organized by Selangor Water Management Authority (LUAS).

ENSEARCH was fortunate to partner with JK Lakshmi Cement Limited, India in providing Mr Sathis Venkitasamy his two weeks internship programme which started on Monday, 15th January to 29th January

2018. JK Lakshmi Cement Limited is a part of the 125 years old JK Organisation. It is an eminent industrial house, with operations in India and abroad. JK Organisation as has a leadership presence in the fields of tyre, cement, paper, power transmissions and sealing solutions, dairy products and textiles. This organisation has three pillars of sustainability which are environment, empowerment and health.

3.2 Cyber Plant Conservation Network (CPCN)

This project has been put on hold due to unavoidable circumstances. ENSEARCH is looking for fresh leads to revive this project. All members are welcome to meet up with ENSEARCH Management Committee to look into how to move forward with this Project idea.

3.3 Education and Training

3.3.1 Introduction

A total of two (2) public trainings, one (1) seminar and one (1) International Conference & Exhibition were organised. The two public trainings were held at ENSEARCH Kota Damansara Training Centre, the seminar at Kelab Golf Negara Subang (KGNS), Petaling Jaya and the Conference & Exhibition was held at Melaka International Trade Centre (MITC), Melaka.

The HRDF "Train the Trainer" Programme saw 14 trainees successfully completing the course and are now Human Resource Development Fund (HRDF) Certified Professional Trainers thanks to the strict guidance of trainer Ms Rita Krishnan.

The 'Environmental Droners for Beginners' 2 Day Training was the first classroom training introducing the topic of Drones following the good response from the Drones Seminar. ENSEARCH successfully organised this with 13 eager ENSEARCH members and were trained by dedicated trainers – Mr Mohd Hairul Fadli and Mr Mohd Fuad.

In the later part of the year, ENSEARCH's resources was fully focussed on the 13th Asia Pacific Roundtable on Sustainable Consumption and Production (APRSCP)

3.3.3 SEMINAR

18 May 2017 – Utilization of Drones / Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAV) in Environmental Management Seminar

In the era of Technology, the use of Drones has many advantages. Thus, ENSEARCH saw it very befitting and timely to promote the use of Drone Technology in Environmental Management, Monitoring, Research, Enforcement and more. We wanted Environmental Management Professionals especially ENSEARCH members, to understand the benefits of this cool invention and how it can enhance their work.

The Seminar had close to 80 participants learning from four interesting Presenters from different backgrounds. These Presenters covered subjects like the uses of Drones, Environmental Monitoring and Research in different scenarios and a Drone flying demonstration.

The venue; Kelab Golf Negara Subang (KGNS) was ideal with suitable open spaces to conduct a drone flying demonstration.

3.3.4 GRANTS

ENSEARCH submitted three proposals for projects but was not successful. One proposal was for a Stakeholder Consultation and the other two were about Water and Energy Footprint Reduction. ENSEARCH will continue to look out for other opportunities.

3.3.5 OTHERS

a. Training Room for Rent

Two ENSEARCH member companies rented the ENSEARCH Training Room for their internal trainings; Tri EcoEdge Sdn Bhd and Sox Nox Asia Sdn Bhd. We will continue to advertise and encourage members to take advantage of the affordable rate to rent the space for their meetings, trainings and other activities. As long as the company is an Individual or Corporate member.

b. In-house training

We submitted at least two proposals but did not secure the project.

In summary, organising our trainings that meet members' and industry demands has a higher chance of success as requests for in-house training is open to other trainers' proposals.

3.3.6 CONFERENCE

The 13th Asia Pacific Roundtable on Sustainable Consumption and Production

The 13th Asia Pacific Roundtable on Sustainable Consumption and Production was held at the Melaka International Trade Centre (MITC) from 24th to the 26th of October 2017. This event was organized by ENSEARCH, with the Asia Pacific Roundtable for Sustainable Consumption and Production (APRSCP) as coorganiser. The APRSCP is involved in developing and promoting sustainable consumption and production (SCP) in the Asia-Pacific. The APRSCP, established in 1997 (more than 19 years ago) and registered as a non-profit organization in Thailand, has held 12 roundtables within the region and has built up a strong network among industry, governments, academia and non-governmental organizations and international organizations in the Region.

Sustainable Consumption and Production is more urgent and relevant now than before as our Earth, now continues to be plagued by disasters and catastrophes caused by consumption and production by the masses, the producers as well as Country Heads. Specialists gathered here for this purpose to disseminate the message, provide leadership as well as the know-how to promote and implement SCP policies, strategies and technologies for a better future.

For this year, the 13th APRSCP focused on three enablers consisting of "Technology and Innovation", "Green Financing" and "Low Carbon Communities".

With the strong support of the public and private sectors, the two-day Conference and Exhibition welcomed delegates, speakers and guests from at least 20 countries. Melaka Chief Minister, YAB Datuk Seri Utama Ir Haji Idris Bin Haji Haron officiated the 13th APRSCP.

EiMAS approved 16 CPD Points to Environmental Management Practitioners and MIP approved 3 CPD Points to Professional Planners who came. On the 3rd day, a Technical Field Visit was organised to Environmental Preservation and Innovation Centre (EPIC) & Hazardous Waste Management Facility at Kualiti Alam, Negeri Sembilan. We also acknowledged Kualiti Alam Sdn Bhd, and Tex Cycle Technology (M) for their Exceptional Performance in Environmental Protection and Management. ENSEARCH would like to thank all the individuals and organisations who supported the Conference, Exhibition and Technical Field Visit.

In 10 and 11 April 2018, the group had also provided trainers namely Mr. Tan Poh Aun and Mr Lim Sze Fook for the Air Pollution Assessment – Level 1 (Beginner) organized by ENSEARCH which had received good response from its members (13 pax). The group in association with SOx NOx Asia Sdn Bhd (ENSEARCH Corporate Member) had successfully carried out a training workshop entitled "Open Air (Free, Open Source Tools for Air Quality Monitoring Data)" on 13 March 2018.

For the coming period namely 2018/2019, the EAQTIG plans to organise a seminar on Continuous Emission Monitoring System (CEMS) for the affected industries which constitute parts of the Environmental Quality (Clean Air) Regulations 2014 requirements which shall be fully enforced in one (1) year time i.e. 2019 sometime in August 2018.

5.0 PRIME MINISTER'S HIBISCUS AWARD 2016/2017

The Prime Minister's Hibiscus Award, the premier National Environmental Award for business and industry in Malaysia, is marking its 21 years since first launched in 1996.

Throughout our long and illustrious history, the Award has the interest of the business community as its principal objective and has contributed to monumental changes that have driven the Malaysian sustainability and environmental landscape. Today, the Award gains the interest of the government, Multinational Corporations and Small Medium Enterprises representing over various industries in Malaysia.

The Award cycle 2016/2017 was officially launched by Minister of Natural Resources and Environment YB Dato Sri Dr. Haji Wan Junaidi bin Tuanku Jaafar on 6 October 2016. The participation of industries and businesses, for the Award has continued to be encouraging. For the current cycle, we received a total of 60 entries, an increase from 54 entries in the previous cycle.

The PMHA Environmental Journalism Award, now in its third cycle, continues to draws tremendous response with 27 entries compared to 18 previously. The quality of the entries was very commendable, reflecting the credible standard of environmental journalism among the Malaysian media.

There were Exceptional Achievement Awards, Notable Achievement Awards, State Awards, Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) Award and Special Project Awards presented to the winning organisations.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Principal activities

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the Association have been prepared in accordance with the basis of preparation and accounting policies as included in Note 3 to the financial statements.

2.2 Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis unless otherwise stated in Note 3.

2.3 Functional currency

These financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia (RM), which is the Association's functional currency.

2.4 Use of estimates and judgement

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

There are no significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements, unless otherwise stated.

3.1 Plant and equipment

(i) Recognition and measurement

Plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalised as part of that equipment.

When significant parts of an item of plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of plant and equipment.

Gains and losses on disposal of an item of plant and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of plant and equipment and are recognised net within "other income" or "other operating expenses" respectively in the income and expenditure account.

(ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of plant and equipment are recognised in the income and expenditure account.

(iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is based on the cost of an asset less, its residual value. Significant components of individual assets are assessed and if a component has a useful life that is different from the remainder of the asset, then that component is depreciated separately.

3.1 Plant and equipment (Cont'd)

(iii) Depreciation (Cont'd)

Depreciation is recognised in the income and expenditure account on a straightline basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of plant and equipment from the date that they are available for use.

The estimated useful lives of assets for the current and comparative periods are as follows:

Office equipments - 25% Furniture and fittings - 25% Renovation - 25%

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change since the previous financial year end in the pattern in which the Company expects to consume an asset's future economic benefits, the Company would review its present depreciation methods and, if current expectations differ, the Company would amend the residual value, depreciation method or useful life to reflect the new pattern.

3.2 Financial instruments

3.2.1 Initial recognition and measurement

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial instrument is recognised initially at the transaction price (including transaction costs except in the initial measurement of a financial asset or financial liability that is measured at fair value through profit or loss) unless the arrangement constitutes, in effect, a financing transaction. If the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, the financial asset or financial liability is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

3.2 Financial instruments (Cont'd)

3.2.2 Subsequent measurement

Debt instruments that are classified as current assets or current liabilities are measured at the undiscounted amount of cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received unless the arrangement constitutes, in effect, a financing transaction.

Debt instruments that meet the following conditions are measured at amortised cost using the effective cost method:

- returns to the holder are determinable, e.g. a fixed amount and / or variable rate of return benchmark against a quoted or observable interest rate;
- b. there is no contractual provision that could result in the holder losing the principal amount or any interest attributable to the current or prior periods;
- c. prepayment option, if any, is not contingent on future events.

Investments in non-puttable ordinary shares, and investments in non-convertible and non-puttable preference shares are measured at cost less impairment, unless the shares are publicly traded, or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, in which case, the investments are measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in the income and expenditure account.

3.2.3 Derecognition

A financial liability or a part of it is derecognised when, and only when, the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the consideration paid, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in the income and expenditure account.

3.2 Financial instruments (Cont'd)

3.2.3 Derecognition (Cont'd)

A financial asset or part of it is derecognised when, and only when, the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or are settled, or control of the asset is not retained or substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred to another party. On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received (including any newly created rights and obligations), is recognised in the income and expenditure account.

3.3 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in hand, balances and deposits with banks and highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the purpose of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents are presented net of bank overdrafts and pledged deposits, if any.

3.4 Equity Instruments

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Instruments classified as equity are measured at cost on initial recognition and are not remeasured subsequently.

3.5 Provision

A provision is recognised if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at pre-tax rate that reflects the market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discounting is recognised as finance cost.

3.6 Revenue

(i) Subscription income

Subscription income is recognised when the right to receive is established.

3.6 Revenue (Cont'd)

(ii) Income from activities

Income and expenditure arising on seminars and projects are recognised upon the seminars and projects being conducted.

(iii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

(iv) Office rental income

Revenue from rental of office is recognised progressively over the term of the lease.

3.7 Tax expense

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax expense is recognised in the income and expenditure account.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the financial period, using tax rates enacted or substantially enacted by end of the reporting period, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous financial years.

Deferred tax is recognised using the liability method, providing for temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the statement of financial position and their tax bases. Deferred tax is not recognised for the initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that is not a business combination and that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss. Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to the temporary differences when they reverse, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same authority on the same taxable entity.

A deferred tax asset is recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which temporary difference can be utilised. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised.


