I, Fauzia Qureshi, am seeking election to the ICOMOS Board to contribute my professional, academic, and institutional experience toward strengthening ICOMOS' leadership at a time when cultural heritage faces growing pressures from climate change, environmental change, and large-scale development.

Over four decades, my work has focused on responding to these challenges through conservation planning, risk preparedness, and integrating heritage concerns within broader development processes. I have contributed to conservation management plans for major historic sites, environmental and infrastructure studies for World Heritage properties, and heritage-at-risk advocacy related to large-scale development projects. I remain actively engaged in continuing professional development through specialized training, conferences, and international forums, ensuring alignment with evolving conservation standards and global practice.

Having served as Vice President during the Interim Council of Management (2007–2017) of ICOMOS Pakistan, I contributed to rebuilding institutional governance and laying the foundations for the Committee's sustained development. Subsequently, as President of ICOMOS Pakistan (2017–2023), I worked to consolidate these foundations by strengthening institutional capacity and deepening engagement with ICOMOS International. During this period, I participated consistently in successive General Assemblies, contributing presentations at the Scientific Symposia, while ensuring regular participation of ICOMOS Pakistan in these Assemblies.

I also collaborated with ICORP on documentary initiatives highlighting heritage challenges in Pakistan. I led research for the Swat episode of *ICORP on the Road* and contributed narration to the Kartarpur Corridor episode, supporting wider international awareness of heritage risk and post-conflict recovery contexts in the region.

During my presidency, I promoted adherence to ICOMOS charters and encouraged Emerging Professionals to assume leadership roles within the Executive Committee. Today, a younger group of professionals leads ICOMOS Pakistan, while I continue to contribute in an advisory capacity, supporting continuity and institutional stability.

At the national level, I organized dialogue on strengthening heritage legislation and supported engagement in World Heritage site management, including facilitating Reactive Monitoring Mission processes where appropriate. I also served as technical advisor on committees addressing development pressures affecting heritage properties.

Beyond my institutional roles, I have worked with civil society organizations to address the impact of development projects on heritage and the environment. This has included advocating for proper Heritage Impact Assessments (HIA) and Environmental Impact Assessments (EIA), raising public awareness, and contributing to informed public dialogue through media engagement and civic participation.

If elected to the Board, I would focus on the following priorities:

1. Strengthening the Voice of the Global South

Many regions face acute pressures from climate change, rapid urban growth, and infrastructure expansion. ICOMOS should continue to amplify regional perspectives and support National Committees in developing countries through knowledge exchange and mentorship.

2. Integrating Climate and Risk Preparedness into Conservation Practice

Environmental change and disaster risk increasingly affect heritage management. ICOMOS can further strengthen practical guidance and collaboration to assist National Committees in addressing these challenges.

3. Strengthening Participation and Institutional Continuity

ICOMOS has strong institutional structures that can be further reinforced through clearer communication, structured consultation, and sustained engagement of Emerging Professionals, supporting continuity and shared responsibility across the organization.

I confirm that, if elected, I will serve actively and attend all required Board meetings. I understand the responsibilities involved and am prepared to commit the necessary time and engagement.

ICOMOS plays a critical role in shaping conservation standards internationally. I would value the opportunity to contribute to its continued work through service on the Board.

CURRICULUM VITAE

Prof. Fauzia Husain Qureshi is an architect, cultural heritage specialist, and Director of FHQ & Associates (SMC-Pvt.) Ltd., with extensive professional and academic leadership in heritage management, conservation planning, and urban development.

She holds a Master of Architecture in Advanced Studies (Urban Settlements in Developing Countries) from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and a Bachelor of Architecture (First Class First) from the University of Engineering & Technology, Lahore.

She taught at the National College of Arts for nearly four decades, retiring in 2011 as Professor and Principal. Throughout her academic tenure, she maintained an active professional practice, integrating field-based conservation expertise into architectural education and strengthening institutional and professional capacity.

Within ICOMOS, she served two terms as President of ICOMOS Pakistan (2017–2023) and earlier as Vice President of the Interim Council of Management (2007–2017), established to revitalize and restructure the National Committee. She played a central role in rebuilding governance structures, expanding professional networks, and aligning national initiatives with ICOMOS International priorities. She has participated in successive General Assemblies, presented at Scientific Symposia, and contributed to international knowledge exchange and training initiatives.

Her professional portfolio spans World Heritage conservation, heritage impact assessment, urban documentation, tourism strategy, Heritage at Risk reporting, and post-disaster recovery. She has authored numerous scholarly publications and presented extensively at leading national and international forums.

Her work advances an integrated approach linking conservation, sustainability, community engagement, and institutional resilience.
