Linked data and verifiable credentials offer valuable opportunities to eliminate redundant paperwork, automate validation, and accelerate trade through globally interoperable digital trust.

Together, they enable "one-click" facilitation and compliance.

This session will demonstrate how verifiable credentials – digitally signed, tamper-proof documents – and linked data – machine-readable connections between datasets – can revolutionize trade facilitation. While verifiable credentials can replace physical certificates with instantly verifiable digital proofs, linked data can automate cross-validation of shipments.

Panel session	Climate targets, circular-economy pledges, consumer expectations and evolving environmental regulations are rapidly reshaping global supply chains and pushing Customs beyond traditional enforcement. Today's "Green Customs" agenda spans HS-code updates for green and circular-economy goods, risk-based targeting of polluting or illegal shipments, facilitation measures for low-carbon products, and partnership with environmental authorities to uphold sustainability commitments.		
	This session will show how Customs can turn trade and logistics data into actionable environmental insights—pinpointing high-risk, high-impact shipments and enabling strade policies. Speakers will present hands-on examples—from HS-code mapping too environmental goods, to joint Customs-environment agency risk frameworks, to "grecorridors" that streamline clearance for certified green products—demonstrating how operations can be simultaneously more sustainable, compliant and efficient. Participants will leave with a clear roadmap for implementing Green Customs reform with WCO guidance and global climate and biodiversity goals, including governance technology enablers and multi-stakeholder collaboration models.

Breakout sessions in two streams

Session A1: Data Without Silos: Accelerating Interoperability with the WCO Data Model

Over the past two decades, the WCO Data Model has become the lingua franca for cross-border regulatory data exchange, yet many administrations still struggle to break free from legacy systems. This breakout session assembles implementation leads from Customs and solution providers to demonstrate how the WCO Data Model can be implemented to enhance interoperability.

The session's second focus looks ahead: preparing the WCO Data Model for verifiable credentials by expressing its elements as Linked Data. Speakers will show how simple JSON-LD contexts and decentralized identifiers let declarations, licences and certificates become tamper-evident digital credentials that machines can instantly verify.

Stream B (English only)

Session B1: Common Format, Shared Vision: Advancing NII Interoperability with UFF 3.0

The Unified File Format (UFF) is a WCO-sponsored, nonproprietary standard for nonintrusive inspection (NII) data—recently elevated to version 3.0.0—designed to ensure interoperability across scanner systems by different vendors, support centralized image analysis, and streamline data exchange between Customs administrations.

This session will gather perspectives from Customs and industry on how UFF implementation can improve operational efficiency and cross-border collaboration. Looking ahead, the discussion will explore how UFF 3.0.0 supports greater automation, detection technologies integration, and standardized technical requirements.

Session A2: Learning Without Borders: The Future of Virtual Training in Customs

As Customs administrations navigate the rapid digital transformation, continuous learning and workforce development are more essential than ever. Virtual training and elearning have emerged as vital tools for equipping officers and stakeholders with the skills needed to adapt to new technologies, evolving regulations, and increasingly complex global trade environments.

This session will examine how Customs and partner organizations are leveraging elearning platforms, virtual simulations, and remote collaboration to deliver effective, scalable training. Panellists will share practical experiences, highlight successful strategies for engaging diverse learners, and discuss how digital training solutions can drive both capacity building and organizational agility.

Session B2: DIY Digital Customs: Empowering Officers to Build Solutions

Customs officers no longer have to wait for long, cost-heavy IT projects to fix everyday bottlenecks like duplicate data entry, missing alerts or manual spreadsheets. Modern low-/no-code environments—often already included in an administration's productivity suite—let non-developers drag-and-drop interfaces, plug directly into existing risk or declaration databases, and spin up secure mobile apps in a single afternoon.

In this session participants will hear case studies to automate workflows and solving real-life issues—all without writing a line of code.

The increasing complexity of global trade requires smarter solutions for securing cargo and ensuring supply chain integrity. IoTenabled smart seals provide real-time tracking, tamper alerts, and digital records, allowing Customs to move from manual inspections to data-driven risk management.

This session will highlight real-world experiences and lessons learned from implementing smart seals in Customs operations. Panellists will discuss practical challenges, opportunities for international collaboration, and the impact of IoT smart seals on border security and trade facilitation.

As trade digitalizes, cyberattacks escalate – ransomware cripples ports, data breaches leak shipment records, and spoofed credentials bypass Customs controls. Cybersecurity has increasingly come to the centre of trade protection.

This session will address urgent vulnerabilities at the intersection of trade infrastructure and cybersecurity and share with participants some practical experience in defending critical supply chain infrastructure through proactive cyber-physical security strategies.

	By the session's end, participants will have witnessed proof of concepts that could soon be piloted at borders worldwide, met the creators behind them, and helped select the winners who will receive mentoring and seed support to take their solutions to the next level. Expect to leave inspired—and armed with new contacts and ideas you can bring back to your own administration or organization.
